Migratory birds in the area: blackbirds (cowbirds, grackles, red-winged), cedar wax wings, kingfishers, robins, sparrows (chipping, grasserhopper, Savannah, swamp) warblers, etc.

Northern waterfowl: common loons, double-breasted cormorants, pied-billed and horned grebes, lesser scaups, redheads, blue-winged and green-winged teals, northern shovelers, northern pintails, American wigeons, ring-necked ducks, red-breasted mergansers, and ruddy ducks.

On warm days, gulf fritillary, zebra long wing, white peacock, cassius and ceraunus blue butterflies
