

SITTING LIGHTLY ON THE LAND: How we develop human habitat, and possibilities for doing it better

Bill's idea of the proper path for development is from the ground (that is, the ecosystem) up. He not only believes in "Construction without Destruction" of native ecosystems, but also has been instrumental, through seventeen years as



the principal landscape architect of his own firm, in putting his ideas into practice throughout Central Florida. Large scale developers like Disney and the D.O.T. are now using native plant species that Bill has promoted and have adopted his emphasis on the use of environmentally functional landscapes over purely decorative but nonfunctional ones. His successful design projects for IMC-Agrico, Mobil, Audubon Society, and Bok Tower Gardens have been acknowledged by state awards. (see page 2)

Bill and his wife Nancy and other family members own and operate the Natives, a wonderful native plant nursery in Davenport, Polk County.

Like Bill, Nancy is an articulate advocate for native landscaping issues. Nancy is a pioneer in the direct seeding of large restoration projects in Florida. We timed our invitation to the Bissetts poorly, as this is the season when Nancy is extremely busy harvesting and preparing seeds: as a result she may not be able to accompany him.

In his presentation Bill will talk about how habitat for humans can be created while preserving or recreating habitat for indigenous species of plants and animals. He will present alternatives to the "status quo" of Florida unfriendly development and outline the principles of environmental landscaping.



PLANT PROFILE

Common name: Coastal-plain

palafox

Botanical name: *Palafox integrifolia* (Nutall) Torrey & A.

Gray

Family: Asteraceae or Compositae (Aster)

Type of plant: Upright semi-

woody perennial

Size: 3 feet (h) by 2 feet (w).

Leaves: Alternate, entire, hairy, linear to lanceolate, lower leaves

linear.

Flower: Pink-whitish florets with purple anthers; ray florets lacking; flowers arranged in terminal branching corymbs.
Flowering time: September to

November. **Fruit:** Achene.

Stem: Upper stem hairy; lower

stem woody.

Habitat/distribution: Sandhills, scrub, and coastal hammocks; zones 9 - 10.

Landscape use: Mass planting in wildflower garden.



Soil: Sandy, well drained.

Light: Full sun.

Water: Drought tolerant. **Propagation:** By seed.

Availability: Some native plant nurseries.

Comments: Dr. Wunderlin reports three species in Florida. P. texana var. ambigua is native to Texas and Mexico; P. feayi is an inhabitant of sandhills and scrub, typically growing taller (up to 9 feet) than P. integrifolia. Both P. integrifolia and P. feayi are endemic to Flordia.
