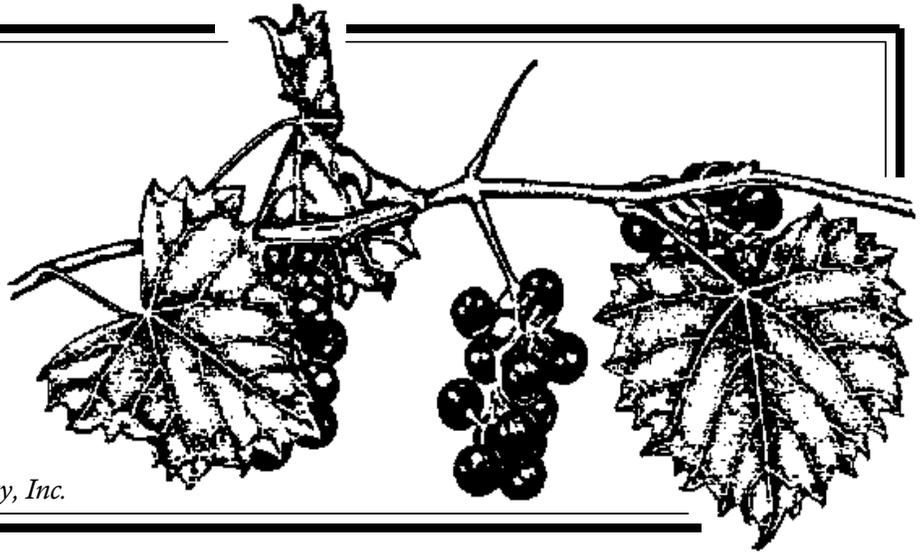

## Plants for Attracting Native Hummingbirds

Wednesday, May 20th 2009 at 7pm  
Hillsborough County Extension Service

Cliff Brown, a Suncoast Native Plant Society member, will be our May guest speaker. His presentation will focus on how to attract and keep hummingbirds coming to your garden by plant selection and garden design. Cliff will also demonstrate how native hummingbird plants can be blended and mixed with other non-nuisance non-native plants.

Cliff is a native Tampan that moved to Temple Terrace in 1964. He received an Associates Degree in Horticulture from HCC in 1991 and worked at the USF Grounds Department for six years before moving on to Eureka Springs, a Hillsborough County Park. Cliff retired from Hillsborough County in 2007 and is now involved with the *Tree and Landscape Committee* at the Extension Service, *Temple Terrace Garden Club*, and *Temple Terrace Preservation Society*. He also serves as president for the *Friends of the Temple Terrace Parks and Recreation Department*, which along with the *Preservation Society* is actively raising funds to rebuild the Bat Tower of Temple Terrace. He lives in Temple Terrace and cultivates native plants, *Tillandsia* species, and orchids and observes the hummingbirds in his garden.

## Field Trip Report: Jennings's Tract Saturday, April 18th

Saturday's SNPS hike was at the Jennings's Tract a.k.a Cypress Creek West, an ELAPP property. Steve Dickman (Shirley had the weekend off) led the hike through historic pasture land where many gopher tortoise burrows were seen and down to the dry hardwood swamp hammock. The morning was cool and some of the hikers were wearing long sleeve shirts. You know how guys are Gail? They are bunch of wussies anyway.

The jeep trail continued east, to a pasture, near I-275 and a large billboard where the Florida's lottery flamingo was standing guard. In this area the group was treated to seeing a swallowtail kite. Earlier, before joining the main group, I walked in to do a little solo bird watching. I saw several thrushes (hermit?), northern parula, prairie warbler, blue grosbeak and a couple of palm warblers.

The group departed this cow habitat, taking a N/S 'road' into the floodplain. Steve pointed out many of the native hammock trees and ferns. We walked further in the floodplain, into sort of a bowl area, enjoying the serenity of old logged cypress tree stumps, maples, and swamp buttonbush. There were many downed fantastic 'lunch' logs here. Steve found a *Tillandsia* that had the Mexican weevil still munching away. This provided a photo op, so great the weevil died from flash exposure, without anyone having to remove their lid!

When it was time to go, Steve gave us the option of returning to the trailhead via the jeep trail that we had used earlier, going through all those beautiful humongous magnolias or a chance to use our 'hand held devices' and go off trail to our cars.

There was not a moment of hesitation, since all of us had more education than common sense, we headed west through the woods, with our navigation tools at the ready, leaving a perfectly good road, so that the animals could enjoy it in peace once again.

The Boys Hiking Club was represented by myself and Jumpin' Joel Jackson. SNPS Members Ron Gilbert and Ron Thuemler also attended.

## Spring Plant Sale - Thank You!

The spring USF Botanical Gardens Plant Sale took place April 11 and 12. Fourteen folks volunteered their time to help make this a successful event. On Friday, April 10, the set-up crew – comprised of **Cliff Brown, Ron Chicone, Mike Fite, Sally Sun** and **Bob Upcavage** – assembled at USF Botanical Gardens around 9:30 a.m. Our largest vendor, Nature Coast member **Dave Barnard**, owner of Cypress Acres Nursery, was already there with his wildflower delivery. We helped him finish unloading the plants. We then set up the tables and arranged the plants on them. **Cliff** and **Troy Springer** also brought some plants; and a couple of members (**Loretta Hodgdon** and **Bob Upcavage**) donated plants for the sale. **Troy** set up the “outreach” table in the back of SNPS’s area.

On Saturday, most of the volunteers arrived around 8 a.m. The last of our deliveries arrived at 7:30 and those of us who got there early scurried to get the plants off the truck and into position. In all, we had about 1,000 plants comprising of 100 species of trees, shrubs, ground covers, wildflowers, ferns and vines; a very nice selection of plants, indeed. The Botanical Gardens members were let in at 9:30 a.m., and the public at 10 a.m. On hand to assist were (all day) **Cliff Brown, Steve Dickman, Jane Halil, Daphne Lambright, Fred Spriggs, Troy Springer** and **Sally Sun**; and (morning) **Margo Funk, Mary Miller** and **Harriett Wright**.

On Sunday, because it was Easter, the Gardens opened an hour later, so the gates opened at 10:30 a.m. We had less than half of the plants left. **Debbie Butts, Ron Chicone, Sally Sun** and **Troy Springer** were there all day. At the close of the sale – 3 p.m. – we also had to disassemble our area; **Cliff Brown** arrived to give a hand with this.

**Troy**, with the help of the other volunteers, staffed the “outreach” table both days. Lots of folks visited; some bought books and/or seed packets, and many walked away with lots of information.

A big **“Thanks!”** to everyone who gave up part of their weekend to help make the plant sale successful. As a thank-you, each volunteer was given a wildflower of their choice.

Financially, we had gross sales of \$5, 082 (in round numbers) and netted about \$1, 917. The various events throughout the year, and especially the semiannual plant sales, are vital to SNPS. Part of the purpose of SNPS is educating the public about native plants. The earnings from these sales help to pay for grants, special speakers’ expenses, the newsletter, and educational projects throughout the area. If you can find a few hours to volunteer next fall, your help would be appreciated. It’s a great way to learn about Florida’s native plants; and it’s even fun!!

## Field Trip Report: Apalachicola National Forest—April 24-26

A small but enthusiastic group spent a weekend in the wilds of the central Panhandle. Some of us camped. Some of us stayed at an old hotel that lacked both an office and basic amenities that most of us consider basic to hotel lodging – but all of us loved the ambiance of old north Florida.

We spent Saturday in the field with leader Josh Hofkes who took us to a mesic forest complete with torreyia, Florida yew, blooming Ashe's and pyramid magnolias, then on to Hosford bog and white-topped pitcher plants (blooming), and a great savanna near Sumatra with trumpet pitcher plant, parrot pitcher plants (blooming), and gulf coast pitcher plants, orchids (*Calopogon barbatus*, *C. pallid*, *Pogonia ophioglossoides*), and many other wonderful rare plants.

A first time plant for several of us was Harper's beauty (*Harperocallis flava*), a rare lily. Sunday, we found our way to Tate's Hell and the dwarf cypress boardwalk. There, bird-watching and wading into a cypress wetland where we were often taller than old trees was a treat!

Field trip attendees included Ron Thuemler, Dr. Shirley Denton, and Jan and Jeff Means.

## PLANT PROFILE

**Common name:** Elliott's milkpea

**Botanical name:** *Galactia elliottii* Nutt.

**Synonyms:** None

**Family:** Fabaceae (Legume)

**Zone:** 8B-11

**Plant Habit:** Evergreen trailing vine

**Habitat:** Scrub, Sandhill, and dry Flatwoods

**Size:** 6 inches (h)

**Leaves:** Shiny, dark green, alternate, pinnately compound with 5-9 leaflets

**Bloom:** White, pea-like flower

**Flowering time:** April to October

**Fruit:** Compressed, hairy, linear pod

**Distribution:** Peninsular Florida

### Growing conditions

**Light:** Partshade to full sun

**Water:** Dry

**Soil:** Sandy

**Propagation:** Seed

**Motility:** Little

**Maintenance:** None

**Availability:** Occasionally from native plant nurseries; not currently listed on the AFNN web site.

**Comments:** Elliott's milkpea is the only white-flowered milkpea in Florida.


