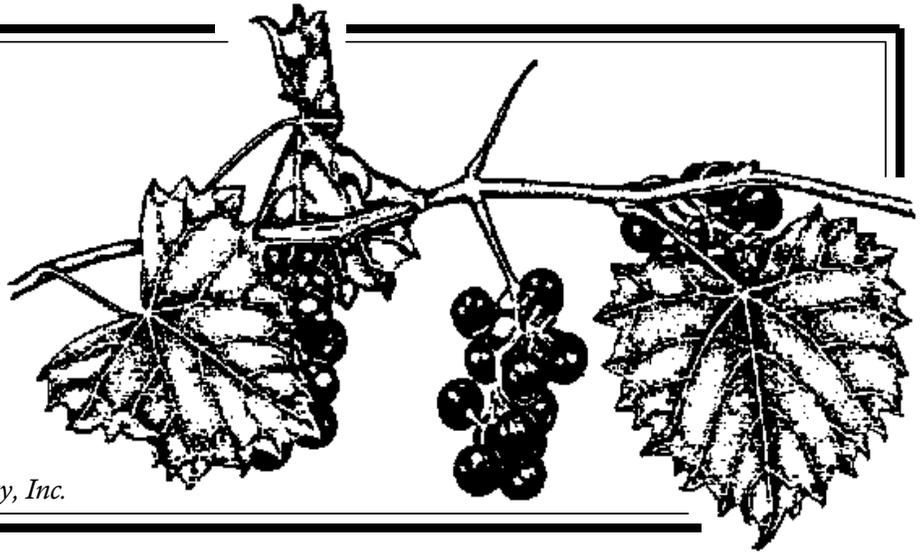



Cockroach Bay Restoration Project

Hillsborough County Extension Service



Twenty-one years ago, the 651 acres in south Hillsborough County was farmland and deep mining pits. Today, it is lush wetlands and vibrant uplands with fish, crabs, shrimp and more than 300 species of birds on this restored stretch of shoreline connecting to eastern Tampa Bay.

The project was a joint effort of Hillsborough County Parks, SWFWMD, 2,500 volunteers and more than 28 government agencies and environmental groups. Richard Sullivan, an environmental scientist and the manager of Cockroach Bay since 1999, will present what and how it was accomplished - and how it affects you, native plant communities and the wildlife of west central Florida.

The Cockroach Bay Project

Multiple species of ducks and white pelicans float in a saltmarsh that was once "a nasty green pond," said Richard Sullivan, an environmental scientist, manager of Cockroach Bay, and employee with Hillsborough County Parks. "It's not just for birds; it's not just for the fish. It's for the people," he continued.

The restoration project started in 1991. It involved scientists studying a 1938 aerial photograph of the coastal areas along the bay to get the land contours, water flow and plant life just right. The marsh is connected to the bay at four points, balancing salt and fresh water to create the perfect nursery conditions for baby fish.

In addition to replenishing the natural beauty, the Cockroach Bay Project restoration cleans polluted storm water runoff through a series of ponds connected through weirs. The water sits in the ponds, allowing pollutants to settle out. When the first pond fills up, the water flows out of the weir to another pond. By the time the water reaches the bay, it is 99.9% pure.

Today, the 641 acre project is complete but this is only half of the more than 1,000 acres that make up the Preserve. Just a few miles away is the Bahia Beach habitat restoration, a 148 acre project near Ruskin that has just started. The county purchased this property in 2001 with ELAPP funds and in 6 or 7 years the area residents will have a preserve similar to the Cockroach Bay Project to enjoy.



Discover the Island 2012 :

Egmont Key

Mark your calendar and head to Egmont Key on Saturday and Sunday, November 10th and 11th for "Discover the Island" to visit and learn about one of Tampa Bay's gems!

The charming 154-year-old lighthouse is still working to guide ships into Tampa Bay. Come see its majestic spiral staircase and participate in the activities sure to enlighten all ages.

See Civil War re-enactors, stroll the island on the self-guided walk with interpretive sites along the way, including nature, military history, and even a fossil pit!. There will be children's games, a silent auction, and much more. The Friends of the Tampa Bay NWR will have wildlife displays and presentations in the restored Fort Dade Guard House.



Food, drinks, and souvenirs will be available for purchase. Shuttle ferries will be leaving Fort DeSoto Park from 9am to 2pm, with the last ferry returning to Fort DeSoto at 4pm.

Day passes include the cost of the ferry: Adults \$18, Youth 6-11 \$5, and Children 5 and under are free. Discounts are available for groups of 10 or more adults. Individual Passes can be purchased online or at the ferry departure site on the beach between the Gulf Pier and Fort Museum.

Discover the Island is the 15th annual fundraiser for the Egmont Key Alliance, a 501(c)(3) non-profit, Citizen Support Organization of Egmont Key State Park, dedicated to protecting, restoring, and preserving the island. To purchase passes or get more information, go to www.EgmontKey.info.

Plant Profile

Common name: Muhly grass

Botanical name: *Muhlenbergia capillaris* (Lam.) Trin.

Synonyms: Hairawn muhly, hair grass

Family: Poaceae

Plant Habit: Perennial bunchgrass

Habitat: Flatwoods, marshes, dunes

Size: 1 to 4 feet (h x w)

Leaves: Dark green, wiry leaves

Bloom: Pinkish to reddish flowers

Flowering time: Fall

Fruit: Small, inconspicuous grain

Distribution: Statewide

Wetland status: Obligate wetland (FDEP); facultative upland (NWI)

Growing conditions

Light: Full sun or light shade

Water: Dry to moist

Soil: Sandy, well-drained

Propagation: Seed

Motility: Slowly by self-sown seeds

Maintenance: Annual pruning to ground

Availability: Most nurseries

Comments: Under-used in the residential landscape; attractive as mass plantings mixed with wild flowers or as a border; attractive right-of-way accent plant

Wunderlin and Hanson (2003) describe 3 varieties in our area: *Muhlenbergia capillaris* var. *capillaris* (hairawn muhly), *Muhlenbergia capillaris* var. *filipes* (Gulf hairawn muhly), *Muhlenbergia capillaris* var. *tricopodes* (cutover muhly).


Take I-4 to Exit 10 (just east of I-75). Go south for two blocks. The office is at the corner of Old Hillsborough Road and County Road 579.
